From His Word ...




Bright red cherries covered the tree in front of the parsonage. Not many are left after the birds and squirrels have had their fill. But it reminded me of the words from Psalm 1: "... a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season" (Psalm 1:3 NIV1984).

How important water was in the arid climate of the Middle East! Streams of water nourished the tree even in the dry season, when the wadis in Israel became parched ground. Picture how the open prairie has no trees except along the river banks.

Who is like such a tree? Whoever delights in God's Word and meditates on it day and night (Psalm 1:2). Like many passages in Scripture, this Psalm refers to all of God's Word as "the law." The Hebrew word for law (*torah*) has the idea of "teaching." All of God's Word reveals his teachings, both his saving teachings (his Good News of full forgiveness in Jesus) and his moral teachings (his commands of what to do and not to do.) Both bring delight to the Christian heart.

During the hot days of summer keep your faith well-watered. Without the weekly routine of school and with vacations and weekend get-a-ways changing our schedules, God's Word can fall by the wayside. Faith slowly withers without us realizing it. How vital the living water of God's Word is for you and me!

Let God's Word soak down to the roots of your soul. Contemplate what you read in the Bible. Chew on what you hear preached each week. Reflect on the words of the hymns as the melodies echo in your head. As God's Word soaks into your heart and mind, what delight, joy, and gladness it brings your soul! You're like a tree planted by streams of living water. Meditate on Psalm 1.


